The Young Women Peacebuilder Awards is a collaborative initiative by partners implementing the South African National Action Plan (NAP) on Women, Peace & Security (WPS). Focusing on enhancing the meaningful involvement of young women in the Women, Peace, and Security agenda, the awards seek those engaged in combatting issues like gangsterism, xenophobia, gender-based violence, and those involved in peace efforts during the 2021 July unrest. Nominees also include individuals working across all four pillars of the NAP on Women, Peace & Security within their communities.

Channon's professional journey includes working at Burhose from 2013 until its liquidation in 2021 during the COVID pandemic. During her unemployment period in 2021, she gained valuable insights into the challenges faced by the youth in her community, witnessing firsthand the impact of high unemployment rates.

Motivated by her extensive netball experience, including being named Sportswoman of the Year in high school, Channon, along with her sister Myrtle Filander, initiated the LOPECO Netball Club in April 2021.

Starting with minimal resources, such as netball poles with old tires and improvised netball rings, Channon dedicated herself to teaching children in the community who had little to

The UN General Secretary proclaimed the 25 of each month as "Orange Day" to raise awareness and take action to end violence against women and girls.

Orange day calls upon Activists, governments, and UN Partners to mobilize people and highlight issues relevant to preventing and ending violence against women and girls, not only once a year on the 25th of November (The international day for the elimination of violence against women, which is also the start day of the 16 days of activism against women and children in South Africa).

The Ladyof Peace Community Foundation as a member of the UNWOMEN Generation Equality Forum action coalition on gender-based violence acknowledges 16 Actors against violence on women and children with an award ceremony on the 21st of December 2022.

Using 16 Actors against violence of women and girls to stand against violence, UNWOMENandLadyofPeace Community Foundation will award activists who pride themselves in raising the bar against violence on women and children, advocating against bystanderism.

This adheres to the principles of the UNITE campaign to honour women movements and highlight survivor-centred movements which provide preventative or responsive support to the marginalized groups of women and girls in areas of high violence.

In 2022, we achieved significant progress by keeping the 16 Actors in our PeaceKona[™] Network. Looking ahead to 2023, we remain committed to the same trajectory in 2024, continuing to uplift, recognize, and support these actions. Notably, last year's focus was on the Gauteng Regions, and this year, our recognition extends to those who go above and beyond the 16 days across four provinces.



The heart of their mission resides in the haven they've created named "Rock of Hope," a place of safety providing love and stability for 235 infants over 12 years.


Rooted in her upbringing, Mientjie's passion for defenseless children stems from her mother's role as a house mother at Jacaranda Children's Home. Despite the overwhelming challenges of baby abandonment, child trafficking, abuse, and poverty, Mientjie and Wouter persist, witnessing miracles of transformation through love, care, and stability.

Their journey, marked by shared dreams, took an unexpected turn after facing numerous miscarriages. The couple, adopting two children and fostering another, expanded their family alongside their 24-year-old daughter from a previous marriage.

Caring for a fluctuating number of children, averaging between 12 to 16, comes with challenges, yet Mientjie and Wouter emphasize the small price to pay for changing lives forever. Mientjie, a teacher with 27 years of experience, currently serves as the Vice Principal of a school for learners with ADHD and high-functioning autism.

In response to the pressing need, the couple established The Rock Place of Safety in 2019. This initiative has grown to encompass eight houses caring for 101 babies and children, totaling 500 over the years. The transformative power of love guides their work, and Mientjie sees God as her Rock, providing strength in the face of challenges.

Despite the sacrifices, Mientjie remains humble, expressing gratitude for a prestigious award nomination and extending well wishes to all nominees. Her remarkable journey exemplifies the profound impact one couple can have through love, compassion, and an unwavering commitment to changing the lives of the most vulnerable in society.







Her personal journey as a survivor of a horrific gangrape, enduring stabbing and being thrown out of a moving vehicle, has fueled her relentless pursuit to improve the lives of GBV survivors, transcending national borders.

As a Zimbabwean national, Nobuhle faced challenges accessing health services after her traumatic experience, motivating her to advocate for survivors, irrespective of their origin. Her voluntary service extends across various organizations dedicated to addressing Gender-Based Violence. Notably, she was a courageous voice at the first GBVF Presidential Summit in 2018, sharing her harrowing story.

Having once lived on the streets, Nobuhle now directs her efforts towards serving over 500 homeless women through a weekly soup kitchen. Beyond providing sustenance, she engages in Domestic Violence interventions, follows up with survivors, and offers voluntary repatriation assistance when needed.

Currently consulting for RiseUpAgainst Gender Based Violence, Nobuhle is instrumental in their approach to addressing GBV with men in taverns. Her multifaceted activism underscores a commitment not only to direct aid but also to systemic change by engaging with various aspects of GBV prevention and support.

Noluyolo Nowonga Mabuza, an expressive poet, and activist was born into the complexities of life, raised by her late grandmother on the dusty streets of Katlehong. The daughter of Xhosa father Godfrey Mqakalana and Swazi mother Zelda Nomaswazi Mabuza, her childhood was marked by the separation of her parents when she was just a toddler. As the second of three children, Noluyolo's resilience and fighting spirit emerged early in life, overcoming health challenges as a baby and later confronting bullies in high school.

Inspired by literary giants like Langston Hughes, Maya Angelou, Audrey Lorde, and Mbuyiseni Oswald Mtshali, Noluyolo found her voice as a poet, expressing thoughts that words failed to convey during the early years of high school. Drawing strength from social misfits like Nina Simone, James "Jimmy" Baldwin, and Muhammad Ali, she embraced her identity as an outlier, aiming to stand out rather than fit into a world unfamiliar with itself.
